

THE STATE CONTRACTOR LICENSE WHY IT MATTERS

Whoever you choose to service your home should be a qualified, trustable individual.

A clear sign to find the right person for the job is to see who is licensed. Below are a few reasons why it matters.

INSURANCE & LIABILITY

Unlicensed contractors likely aren't insured either. Most homeowners' insurance will only cover work done by state licensed contractors.

Since unlicensed contracts aren't legally enforceable, you will have to assume financial responsibility if any problems arise.

HOMEOWNERS MUST ASSUME LIABILITY:

- 🏠 *If a worker gets injured on their property.*
- 🏠 *If the project not meet code.*
- 🏠 *If the project causes future damage to home.*
- 🏠 *For payment to sub-contractors and are subject to liens.*

BUILDING CODE COMPLIANCE

If the project is not built to code, or a permit is not pulled, it may have to be removed or re-done properly.

This is a costly inconvenience, and is easily avoidable by following the proper steps. A licensed contractor follows the rules.

TESTING & CERTIFICATION

There is a reason that licensed contractors are required to learn the trade and pass the test.

Allowing an unqualified and inexperienced contractor to do any type of work on your home is a major risk.

Contractors lacking qualifications will probably deliver very low-quality work.
